Hello.

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the removal-killing- of 9 Heritage Trees at 590 Castro.

The Sobranto company wants to destroy these trees.

It will make their construction project less expensive and easier if they can simply clear anything standing.

## Preserving the trees is a question of Public Health. The trees filter particulate matter from our polluted air,

especially during the fire season which is now a lot more than a couple of months. Particulate matter kills
