Dear Mayor Kamei and Members of the City Council:

The LWV supports actions that cope with the jobs/housing imbalance, as well as actions that reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The LWV also supports affordable housing for all Californians. For these reasons, we have supported the North Bayshore Precise Plan (NBSPP) since 2017 when it was adopted with its strong residential component. We compliment the Council, the EPC, Staff and Google for their hard work on the plan and look forward to its implementation.

As we have stated before, we are enthusiastic about Google's proposed Master Plan, which includes 7,000 new housing units with a target of 20% below-market-rate (BMRs), or approximately 1,400 affordable housing units, through a combination of moderate-income on-site inclusionary units along with land dedications where affordable housing developers can reach deeper levels of affordability.

Google's proposal envisions newly created neighborhoods with parks, retail, offices, and housing, all in a bike-pedestrian friendly plan, the type of sustainable community that the LWV applauds. We also commend Google for planning on a mix of unit sizes.

We are pleased that Google plans to dedicate three parcels for all-affordable housing in the first two phases of its Master Plan, estimated to provide up to 528 deed-restricted affordable homes. We appreciate that more than 40% of the total housing units are expected to be built during Phases 1 and 2, as this will begin to alleviate the jobs/housing imbalance. We generally support the streamlining requested by Google as there has already been much community and Staff input; we especially want to see the housing built as rapidly as possible. We hope that with streamlining, Google's plans will be completed sooner than the 30-year timetable requested.

Our major concern is the potential for the parcels, dedicated to the City for affordable housing, to remain undeveloped due to financing challenges. We urge the City to work with Google and non-profit housing developers to come up with a financing strategy and make this housing available as soon as possible. While we understand that the City has many proposals for all-affordable housing in the pipeline, and are pleased to see so many choices, we know that the number of projects could strain the City's affordable housing funds. We are also aware that because the Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC) are so competitive, the City may be called on to provide more funds than has been typical in the past, making up for a potential shortfall in LIHTC. We hope that the City will be willing to prioritize these much needed opportunities to increase affordable housing.
