The Mountain View Chamber of Commerce wishes to thank you for this opportunity to voice its support of the City Staff's recommendation to approve Google and Lendlease's Middlefield Park Master Plan.

The Chamber represents over 750 businesses in Mountain View, and recognizes that economic growth requires more than office space. Every sizable construction project must include consideration for affordable housing, public open space, sustainability, and mobility - in addition to increasing retail and commercial opportunities. The Middlefield Park Master Plan addresses all of these areas and more, while remaining compliant with the City's East Whisman Precise Plan:

- Up to 50,000 square feet of public retail and community spaces, featuring street-level shops, dining and other activities
- Up to 1,900 new homes, 20% of which will be affordable at a range of below-market rates.
- 12+ acres of public open space, 7 acres of which will be given to the City for public parks and recreation.
- 3+ miles of new walking and cycling trails, including bike-pedestrian path links to Stevens Creek Trail, the Bay Trail, and Mountain View and Sunnyvale downtowns.
- 24/7 carbon-free buildings, with industry-leading green building standards across the project.

Regarding commercial and economic opportunity, its small business program will prioritize financial and in-kind support for small, local businesses owned by women and individuals from underserved backgrounds, as well as emerging small businesses and nonprofits, to help them stabilize and grow. The project will contribute \$30M in community benefits (significantly more than the \$19M required), including \$18.6M for a small business diversification and nonprofit inclusion program. In addition, the project will bring significant additional annual property tax revenue to the City, County and school districts, as well as one-time impact fee payments towards needed City services such as housing and transportation.

The Chamber supports the City's vision of a vibrant city that invites merchants, shoppers, visitors, and residents to work, live, play and shop. Middlefield Park conforms to this vision while complying with City requirements. The project is poised to be both an anchor and a catalyst for the broader evolution of the 400-acre East Whisman area into a sustainable, transit-oriented residential neighborhood and employment center, as outlined in the City's East Whisman Precise Plan.

We urge the City Council to support City Staff's recommendation for approval.

Since the early 1980s, I and organizations that I work with have overseen the investigation and remediation of subsurface contamination in Mountain View, particularly chlorinated solvents found at historical industrial and "dry" cleaning properties. While our principal focus has been the protection of public health, a closely related objective has been to enable the safe reuse of contaminated property, even for sensitive uses such as housing.

Working with U.S. EPA and state environmental agencies, Mountain View has become a national leader in planning for the safe reuse of property subject to vapor intrusion, the migration of toxic volatile substance from the subsurface into overlying building.

My organization has prepared two related articles arguing that it is safe and appropriate to build housing on Mountain View's contaminated properties. While we have made several recommendations to strengthen existing protections, we feel comfortable that the housing planned for Middlefield Park can be safe for all segments of our population.

Dear Mayor Ramirez and Members of the City Council:

The LWV supports government action to provide affordable housing for all Californians. As such, we have been enthusiastic about the Middlefield Park Master Plan throughout the process, with its large amount of housing around transit with planned amenities.

We accept the results of the independent analysis of the BMR Alternative Mitigation, and we would like to reiterate its finding that the affordable housing is predicated on "significant external funding sources." As Council was made aware in their August review of the Affordable Housing Strategic Plan, there is a major shortfall in the City's internal funding availability. Other funding sources also remain very competitive.

As such, we would like to see Google, Lendlease, and the City continue to work on providing concrete steps to ensure that this housing does get built. This is especially important because Mountain View's draft Housing Element depends on this and North Bayshore for a large portion of its site inventory, as mentioned in the "Progress in Meeting the RHNA" and "Specific/Master Plan Areas" sections of the HCD review letter.
