Recipient of your utility rate plans, I have three comments.

1) The statement oot the bottom of page 1 "The City is committed to providing customers with safe, reliable, and affordable drinking water." Is not exactly true.

The term "safe" is not factual according to the National Toxicology Program. There are risks posed to the developing brains of children, especially in the fetal stages. Would it be possible to provide notice of this fact to your customers? Evidence is attached.

2) A rather small amount of money could be saved by obtaining water that is not fluoridated.

3) I recognize that the water in MV comes already fluoridated by Valley Water of by San Francisco, but there is no record of MV asking either supplier to notify customers of the risks of fluoride, let alone to leave it out of the supplies. Both suppliers refuse to give up the false claim that fluoridated water is safe.
