## REDUCE BARRIERS

The Library strives to create the best possible customer experience for those who use our services. This fiscal year, we continued to devise new ways to reduce barriers to access.



Increased maximum account balance to keep more library cards active for borrowing.



Increased the number of holds allowed at one time.



Created an e-card option to provide easy access to the digital library.



Ordered a new all-electric cargo van to replace the existing gas powered bookmobile for more sustainable and flexible mobile library services.

The Library instituted the first phase of the Student Connect Card Program in fall 2021 and issued cards to students from MVLA.

3,867 Student Connect Cards issued during FY 21-22.

#### **Expanding Access**

The Library will work with other area schools during the upcoming fiscal year to expand the Student Connect Card program and provide access to Library collections for more students in the community.



# CELEBRATE DIVERSITY






## EXPAND DIGITAL

The increase in digital library usage has been a trend in libraries for many years now. Usage of eBooks spiked during the pandemic and they remain in high-demand as activities return to prepandemic levels.





- Regional wildflower seeds through the #PlantWildflowers campaign




Refreshed the Teen Zone to create a welcoming space for teenagers to hangout at the Library.




Led Common Core-aligned field trips for elementary school students to learn about local history through the Library History Center.

#### Rent Relief

The Library hosted staff from the Community Development Department for rent relief workshops throughout the year.

- 38 sessions offered
- 608 people helped

#### Tax Assitance

In-person income tax filing assistance resumed at the Library in 2022. Volunteers from United Way Bay Area help qualifying individuals file their income taxes for free.
