**SUBJECT:** Results of Community Survey on Residents Living in Vehicles

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide the City Council with a short summary of results of the Community Survey on residents living in vehicles.

To ensure received feedback on this complex issue, the City conducted a survey from September 2 to September 19. The surveys were placed at City facilities, a link posted online via *Open City Hall (OCH)*, and mailed postcards to areas experiencing a high volume of people living in vehicles. The survey was available in English and Spanish. There were 828 (including 18 received in Spanish) surveys returned coming from a majority of online submittals (includes OCH registered and unregistered replies), and then returns to City facilities, e-mails, and direct mail-ins. The survey had 10 questions in total, comprised of open-ended, closed-ended, and 1-to-10 scale questions, with the last question being entirely open-ended for the respondent.

- The majority of respondents see people living in vehicles near their homes, businesses, and elsewhere in Mountain View and have a higher level of concern. Significant concern was expressed regarding:
  - The supply of housing (75 percent).
  - The needs of people living in cars and vehicles (66 percent).
  - The impact on nearby residences and businesses (70 percent).
- Just over 6 percent of respondents said they had never seen anyone living in a vehicle in Mountain View.

- Just over 71 percent of respondents indicated they were concerned above 5 on a scale of 1 to 10 for people living in vehicles. A majority of concern was also noted for the specific needs of vehicle dwellers. The largest concern was substandard living conditions with about 75 percent. Two-thirds of respondents answered that it was not a stable housing source. Slightly more than one-half cited vulnerability to crime as a concern. Only about one-third of respondents wrote in an answer, and the most common one was sanitation, with 10 percent.
- Forty percent (40%) are concerned with impact on business and about 75 percent of respondents answered their concern was a 6 or greater on a scale of 1 to 10. Concerns noted for the impacts on surrounding areas of increased trash and/or waste spills was by about 75 percent of respondents.
- Seventy-two percent (72%) of people indicated that they were not aware of what the City was doing to address the issue of people living in their vehicles. About 10 percent were aware.
- Local government and community-based service providers were seen as having the main role in solving this issue by the majority of the respondents. Nonprofits received about 45 percent and faith-based organizations received about 35 percent of respondents.
- The majority of respondents see offering basic care and hygiene and increasing affordable housing as solutions. Short-term emergency housing, ongoing services and housing to the chronically homeless, and restricting parking all received support in the mid-40 percent range.

Questions 4, 6, 7, and 8 had write-in for "other" comments and the feedback was similar to the final Question 10, which was the only write-in. The most common experiential response dealt with the respondent self-identifying as living near a site with people living in their vehicles. Many noted responses were shaped by a broad concern in the community, not a direct experience or a specific policy recommendation.

- Responses ranged (in descending number) the desire for homeless people and those living in vehicles to be able to access basic services, the unfairness of individuals living in public spaces without paying taxes, public health, promoting dignity and respect in seeking a solution, blight, traffic/traffic safety, property values, and several quality-of-life issues.
- The most common noted perception was that the homeless and living-in-vehicle community were in their situation due to unfortunate circumstances, personal

struggles, and forces outside of their control. There was also a significant perception that some individuals may have economic means, and that some are coming from outside the Mountain View community and may struggle with drug/alcohol abuse and criminality.

• Many write-in solutions included the need for additional housing, support for a government-sponsored parking program, support for rent control, and support for a temporary shelter being among the most common answers.
