  - 2. Please provide a brief summary of the project/program/event to be funded by the grant.

The Rapid Response Network relies on 2 types of outreach and awareness activities; 1) Efforts to make sure that all residents are aware of the hotline number and feel empowered and confident to call it whenever they see or think they see ICE, especially those who may be in fear because of their immigration status and 2) Outreach and awareness activities to increase the number of Santa Clara County and Mountain View residents who know about the hotline number, can call it in the event that they see ICE, and are trained as Rapid Responders to assist their fellow community members in the event of ICE presence in our community.

3. What is the need or the issue that you are addressing with this grant?

The RRN and critical outreach addresses fear in our immigrant communities and mixed-status families, provides a sense of power in having an organized way to defend their neighbors and families, and provides services for people threatened w/deportation. In general, the RRN hotline provides bilingual dispatchers 24/7 to answer the hotline for any ICE emergency, activates Rapid Responders to immediately go to the site of the ICE action, mobilizes immigration attorneys immediately to assist a community member who may be detained by ICE, and coordinates Family Support and sanctuary for any family members of a detained individual who may need support.

- 5. What other similar project/program/event exists to serve Mountain View residents? How is your proposed project/program/event unique from similar projects/programs/events?

No other similar emergency hotline exists to serve Mountain View residents. In the past year, RRN has provided Rapid Responder trainings in Mt. View, collaborated with the Civic Leadership academy, and conducted outreach activities with Mountain View families.

6. Will you collaborate with other organizations to deliver the project/program/event funded by this grant? If so, which organizations and how?

Yes, the RR Network is a collaboration of multiple organizations that have developed the hotline and continue to run it, including Sacred Heart, PACT, Catholic Charities, South Bay Labor Council, Latinos United for a New America, Amigos de Guadalupe, Human Agenda, Community Legal Services of East Palo Alto (CLSEPA), Pangea, the Mexican Consulate, local government agencies in Santa Clara County. All RRN partner organizations, as well as many other organizations who are part of our broader network, are a part of the RRN Outreach efforts.

### SECTION 3: PROJECT/PROGRAM/EVENT BUDGET

Currently, the RRN has \$100K in annual funding from the County of Santa Clara with all other costs being covered by in-kind efforts of RRN partners, including Outreach. Thus a \$10,000 Community for All grant request is equal to approximately 10% of current approved funding, as of 9/18. As you can see in the attached budget, the RRN costs total \$1 million and is not sustainable with only \$100K in external funding. Currently, RRN is actively seeking additional support from other funding sources including County of Santa Clara and City of San Jose and is seeking initial funding support from all cities in SCC to support its operations and outreach.

- 4. If this is an ongoing project/program/event, how will you sustain it for the long-term?

  RRN is currently developing a long term funding strategy and will leverage funds from all sources, and especially the 15 cities in SCC, to demonstrate local government support of and financial commitment to the RRN to other potential funders.
- 5. Will you be charging any fees for this project/program/event? If yes, briefly describe.

No funds are charged. Any resident of Santa Clara County, including Mountain View, can call the RRN hotline 24/7 when they believe they see ICE in their community to receive immediate support from bilingual dispatchers, trained Rapid Responders, immigration attorneys on call for emergencies, and family support.

					On average, an emergency activation attorney spends 6 hours per case including emergency same day legal representation/consultation the day of their arrest at the ICE processing center in San Francisco, representing these individuals before ICE by submitting bond requests, requesting service of documents, challenging erroneous classifications of detainees, advocacy requests, such as requests to house SCC residents locally in detention facilities in Northern California, coordinating with the Northern California Regional Raid Response work, collecting documents and placing the case with a full-scope attorney.
					For FY 2018-2019, RRN expects 70 to 80 SCC residents to require attorney emergency activation. In 2017-2018, an average of 5-6 SCC residents/month received emergency legal services through the RRN hotline.
