SUMMER READING RECAP

Summer Reading concluded on Thursday, July 31 with the End of Summer Dance Party. A total of 1,592 residents registered for Summer Reading this year, including 1,034 children, 161 teens, and 397 adults. Participants may collect their prizes at the Children's Room desk or second floor information desk throughout August.

For now, the Children's Room remains vibrant with paper caterpillars and tissue paper butterflies attached to the walls. Children who registered for Summer Reading made a caterpillar and wrote the titles of their favorite books, and those who were halfway through the reading challenge made butterflies.







MVHS YEARBOOKS AVAILABLE ONLINE

The Library is proud to announce the availability of <u>digitized Mountain View High School</u> <u>yearbooks</u> spanning 1904-1929. This unique and valuable collection of yearbooks has long been housed at the <u>Mountain View History Center</u>, but it is now available to access online thanks to a grant through the <u>California Revealed digitization initiative</u>. The collection can be accessed through <u>California Revealed</u> and <u>Internet Archive</u>.

This collection of yearbooks chronicles Mountain View High School's first 25 years from its founding along El Camino Real and its first graduating class in 1904 to the opening of its building on Castro Street, which the school occupied until 1982.

The yearbooks contain the names and photographs of faculty and students, as well as information about student activities, advertisements from local businesses, written reflections, short fiction, and inside jokes. Most of these early yearbooks also contain details about MVHS alumni and their lives post-graduation. Inside, viewers will find details about the experience of World War I, the influenza epidemic of 1918-1919, and the Prune & Apricot Exposition. As you move through the collection from the oldest to the most recent issue you can perceive the growing importance of secondary education and the emergence of youth culture facilitated by the automobile.

In addition to yearbooks, residents can also view the History Center's collection of <u>digitized</u> <u>primary resources</u> on California Revealed including historic photographs and audio recordings of oral interviews from Mountain View's Japanese, Mexican, and Spanish immigrants.

EXPANDED HISTORY CENTER HOURS

The <u>Mountain View History Center</u> expanded its operating hours to include Thursday evenings from 4:00-8:00 p.m. starting July 17. The additional hours will make the History Center's collections and services more accessible, allowing more residents to explore its unique resources and deepening their interest in Mountain View's history. The History Center will continue to be open on Tuesdays from 1:00-5:00 p.m. or by appointment.

STATUES FEATURED IN PROFESSIONAL PUBLICATION

The *Wind in the Willows* statues outside the Library in Pioneer Park were featured in the <u>July</u> <u>2025 issue of School Library Journal</u>. The article highlights statues honoring children's literature in parks and libraries across the United States.

The Library's statue collection, *Toad's Book Club*, is included on page 10 of the issue. Accompanying text reads: "*Toad's Book Club* may be the only work on this list attached to

something living: Sculptor Albert Guibara created a door in an oak tree trunk, with Badger and Toad on either side and Ratty perched up in the tree."

School Library Journal is a monthly publication for people who work with youths in schools and public libraries. Articles cover book and media reviews, advancements in technology, changes in education policies, and current events that impact libraries.





TECHNOLOGY SHOWCASE

Library staff attended the Technology Showcase on Thursday, July 17. They interacted with 206 visitors, issued 11 library cards, and used a prize wheel to distribute free swag.

A <u>Mountain View Voice article</u> that reported on the Technology Showcase included a segment about the Library.

"It wasn't just tech companies presenting at the event. Attendees could also learn about the offerings at the Mountain View Public Library.

"Libraries are here to stay," said librarian Ashley Lang. "Even though technology changes over time, [the library is] still a big, important presence."

With a library card, "you have access to a multitude of resources," including audio and e-book platforms like Hoopla and Libby, Lang said. She added that the library plays an important role in breaking down barriers to access, offering computers, free Wi-Fi and portable chargers to those who might need them."


PROGRAMS

Past Program Highlights

Sixty-one children learned about the significance of alebrijes in Mexican culture and practiced making sculptures at one of the Art Around the World programs in July. Art Around the World introduced children to other countries and cultures by featuring a different country's folk art every other week during the summer.
