SUBJECT: Library Director's Report

ANNOUNCEMENTS

• The Library's regular operating hours will change due to the holidays:

- Closed Tuesday, December 24, through Thursday, December 26, in observance of Christmas.
- Open with limited hours from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Monday, December 30.
- Closed Tuesday, December 31, 2024, through Wednesday, January 1, 2025, in observance of New Year's.

CALIFORNIA FREEDOM TO READ ACT

<u>Assembly Bill 1825</u> was just signed by <u>Governor Gavin Newsom</u>. The bill prohibits banning books because of the race, nationality, religion, gender identity, sexual orientation, disability, socioeconomic status, or political affiliation of a book's subject, author, or intended audience.

The bill also requires libraries to develop and make public a policy governing how library staff select, acquire, and manage library materials. The policy must include a process for the public to challenge library materials. This bill protects library staff from being fired or disciplined if they follow the policy when they make programming decisions or refuse to remove a book.

PORTABLE CHARGERS

Customers looking to charge their phone, tablet, or other device may borrow one of two portable chargers at the Library's second-floor information desk for up to two hours. The chargers have built-in cables for USB-C, iOS/Lightning, and Micro USB devices. USB-A or USB-C cables are available for connecting to a wall adapter or laptop.



SOCIAL STORY

Library staff created a <u>Social Story</u> that residents can access through the <u>Children and Teen page</u>. The Social Story is a visual resource designed to prepare children for a visit to the Library and explains what they might see, hear, and experience. Children with sensory needs may find the narrative especially useful.

NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

Residents were invited to celebrate Native American Heritage Month with the Library by attending a virtual author talk, where guest speakers shared personal experiences and dove deeper into Native American history.

- Navajo Ranger <u>Stanley Milford, Jr.</u> joined us online to talk about the chilling and clear-eyed memoir <u>The Paranormal Ranger</u>, which recounts his investigations into bizarre cases of the paranormal and the unexplained in Navajoland.
- History professor and critically acclaimed nonfiction author <u>Kathleen DuVal</u> discussed her history book <u>Native Nations</u>: <u>A Millennium in North America</u>. Her work shows how the definitions of power and the means of exerting it have shifted over time, but the

sovereignty and influence of Native peoples remained a constant and will continue far into the future.

Mona Susan Power chatted about her newest novel, <u>A Council of Dolls</u>. Her book explores
Native rights and Native American culture using an important symbol that anchors comfort
and companionship in Native life: dolls. Staff also published booklists for <u>youth</u> and <u>adults</u>
to the website and created a book and media display.



LOCAL HISTORY DISPLAYS

Library staff have refreshed three Mountain View history displays outside the Second Floor Program Room. These displays feature photographs and clippings from the History Center collection and focus on Mountain View's housing history, water history, and landmarks that have been lost—or gone wandering—over the years.

The <u>History Center</u> is open on Tuesdays from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m or by appointment.







SILICON VALLEY READS 2025

Each year, <u>Silicon Valley Reads</u> brings Mountain View together with neighboring Santa Clara County libraries and other organizations to read and learn about an important topic that will jumpstart conversations. Next year's theme, "Empowering Humanity: Technology for a Better World," will highlight books and events that focus on how artificial intelligence will impact our lives and the future of our communities as well as the ethics surrounding its usage. Featured books for adults include <u>The Worlds I See: Curiosity, Exploration and Discover at the Dawn of AI</u> by Dr. Fei-Fei Li, <u>The Mountain in the Sea</u> by Ray Nayler, and <u>Loneliness & Company</u> by Charlee Dyroff.

The Library will provide programming related to Silicon Valley Reads and its theme in the first quarter of 2025.

WELLNESS ACTIVITIES

The Library's Wellness Committee has been working hard to provide staff with fun treats and activities. Retired police dog Zeus enjoyed lots of attention from Library staff who stopped by to meet and play with him. In October, the Committee treated staff to a spread of donuts, candy, fruit, hot apple cider, and other treats on Halloween. Staff also received a shirt with the Library's embroidered logo.

The Wellness Committee's next event will be a holiday party for staff on Wednesday, December 11.
