
CALIFORNIA STATE LIBRARY 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

The California State Library recently published its <u>2024 Annual Report</u>. The report includes information about various state initiatives, including the Building Forward Libraries Facilities Improvement program, Broadband Program, Sustainable California Libraries grant program, Lunch at the Library, Career Online High School, California Revealed, and more. The California State Library also compiled a summary of 2024 statistics into the infographic below.

Throughout the years, the Mountain View Public Library has participated in several State Library programs that continue to bolster our community by:

- Providing free access to high-speed internet at the Library through the Broadband for All program.
- Promoting programs and services and offering free books to youth at community-based meal sites through the Lunch at the Library program.

- Lending California State Parks Passes to enhance physical and mental wellness.
- Supporting adults in their pursuit of a free high school diploma and career certificate through the Career Online High School program.
- Developing our work force with robust job help resources offered through the Career Pathways program.



PRESSREADER

Library cardholders can now access a broad collection of national and international publications through PressReader, an online platform that provides full-color access to over 7,000 digitized publications in over 60 languages representing over 120 countries. PressReader connects the Mountain View community to news from around the world with access to newspapers and magazines from Argentina, Brazil, the Dominican Republic, France, Hong Kong, India, Japan, the Philippines, Romania, and more.

The PressReader collection features publications in multiple languages, including, but not limited to, Spanish, Chinese, Arabic, German, Japanese, Norwegian, and Swedish. Articles can be

translated into 18 additional languages such as Hindi, Korean, Pashto, Persian, Russian, Slovak, Tamil, Urdu, and Vietnamese. With 51.2% of Mountain View's population speaking a language other than English at home, the inclusion of PressReader as one of the Library's free online resources supports the City Council's initiative for a Community for All by making worldwide publications easily accessible for every resident, regardless of language or country of origin.

PressReader also facilitates on-the-go reading. Residents may download the app and create a free account so they can follow their favorite publications, download issues automatically for offline browsing, and print and share articles.

This powerful platform provides same-day publication and issues going back as far as 60 days. Searchable by country, title, and date, customers can stay updated on news from home and beyond. Customers may access PressReader without a Library card if they use the public computers or are connected to the Library's WiFi. Customers who wish to access PressReader outside the Library may login with their Library card.

CAREER ONLINE HIGH SCHOOL VIDEO TESTIMONIALS

The Library recently invited Career Online High School graduates to share their experiences in the program through a <u>video testimonial</u>. The Career Online High School Program provides adults with the opportunity to earn a high school diploma and career certificate over 18 months. This self-paced online program can help jumpstart careers and open new opportunities.

Since the program's beginning in 2020, nine people have successfully graduated and continue to develop their potential. Currently, eight more learners are making excellent progress toward their goals.

EARTH MONTH

Library staff is gearing up to celebrate Earth Month this April with several special events:

- <u>Tuesday, April 8</u>—Master Gardeners Mary Werthman and Ann Northrup will discuss how gardeners can be part of the solution to climate change.
- <u>Saturday, April 26</u>—All residents are invited back to the Library's annual plant exchange in the Bookmobile garage.

A talk on the importance of the Bay Area wetlands presented by the Peninsula Open Space Trust and a landscaping class held by Public Works and the Bay Area Water Supply and Conservation Agency are in the works. Staff is also planning to create environmental-themed displays and booklists. Library staff will also attend the <u>Earth and Arbor Day Celebration</u> on Saturday, April 19,

organized by the City's Community Services Department and Sustainability and Resiliency Division.

SILICON VALLEY READS ENDS

<u>Silicon Valley Reads</u> is coming to an end. With the theme of "Empowering Humanity: Technology for a Better World," residents gained a deeper understanding of artificial intelligence (AI) and the ways it has and will continue to impact our lives.

The Library invites residents to wrap up 2025 Silicon Valley Reads by attending a special event this month:

- <u>Friday, March 21</u>—Kids are invited to drop by Pioneer Park and contribute their artistic talents to a chalk art mural that celebrates the Silicon Valley Reads-featured book <u>The Wild</u> <u>Robot</u>.
- <u>Friday, March 28</u>—Teens and adults are welcome to a workshop presented by ThinkPads4All, where they will operate on a provided ThinkPad T480 to learn about assembly, disassembly, and essential repairs.
- <u>Sunday, March 30</u>—Attendees will become immersed in the enchanting world of <u>The Wild Robot</u> with a captivating virtual author talk featuring Peter Brown, the acclaimed author of the beloved series. This unique online event offers a rare opportunity to delve into the author's creative process and learn about his inspiration behind the heartwarming story of Roz the robot.

Past Program Highlights

Twelve (12) attendees learned how AI has evolved over the past year in a presentation by Dr. Anthony Chow, Professor and Director of the San Jose State University iSchool. Dr. Chow also introduced the audience to an AI robot named Rosie, who has the ability to answer questions, dance, fist bump, and more.

From Palo Alto HS, Sam McDonald as a young boy lived and worked in Gilroy in 1890s. He worked for Stanford from 1903-1954. Before he died in 1954,he donated 400 acres to Stanford. In 1958, land renamed Sam McDonald Park in San Mateo County. Seaman Harris ran a bootblack shop in 1896 on the Stanford campus. The Harris Family still lives in Palo Alto today.
