

Parks and Recreation Strategic Plan – City Council and Community Feedback
Summary of Feedback Themes and Plan Revisions

On January 27, 2026, the City Council held a Study Session to review and provide feedback on the draft Parks and Recreation Strategic Plan (Plan), which had been available for public review beginning January 13, 2026. During the public review period, staff met with community members and received written input through the project website and by email. During the Study Session, Councilmembers offered positive feedback on the Plan’s accuracy and completeness, as well as the goals, strategies, and action plan. Council also directed staff to make revisions in the following areas:

- Establishing a new goal focused on biodiversity and natural park design elements and incorporating the importance of parks as part of the natural environment throughout the Plan;
- Refining and strengthening the Plan’s vision statement;
- Allocating trail corridor acreage by Planning Area;
- Adding an Action Item to continue to expand Learn-to-Swim opportunities; and
- Integrating opportunities for “Friends of Parks” groups and incorporating a review of POPA Standards within existing action items;

Due to the breadth of revisions, the updated draft is not presented in track changes format. The purpose of this attachment is to summarize the key themes raised by the City Council and community members, and to identify where and how those themes have been addressed in the revised Plan presented for Parks and Recreation Commission review on March 17, 2026.

The five Planning Areas with the lowest level of service (Rengstorff, Thompson, Sylvan-Dale, Stierlin, and Central) have not changed.
