## **STAFF UPDATES**

#### **WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT FUNDING TO LIBRARY**

The City Council gave the go-ahead for close to \$170,000 in one-time American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to Library workforce development programs. These programs are:

- Career Online High School (\$135,075)—In partnership with the California State Library, participants can earn an accredited high school diploma and credentialed career certificate at the same time.
- Universal Class (\$22,000)—Library users can access over 550 online classes through a course catalog.

• Brainfuse's Jobnow (\$12,000)—Participants receive live, interactive online career coaching services, along with a web-based career resource hub that includes a resumé builder.

#### "All Together Now" Summer Reading 2023 Kickoff Concert

The Summer Reading Kickoff concert was held on Saturday, June 3, with two family-friendly concerts by the renowned bluegrass band the Goat Hill Girls and by Grammy nominee Megan Schoenbohm. There were frozen treats, activities, and a special welcome from the Mayor.

The kickoff by the numbers:

- Estimated number of people who attended the kickoff concert: 250.
- Frozen treats handed out: 204.
- Badge books given to kids: 110.
- Number of kids who enrolled in the Summer Reading Program: 125.
- Number of adults who enrolled in the Summer Reading Program: 46.
- Number of teens who enrolled in the Summer Reading Program: 19.

# Past Program Highlights

On Tuesday, April 18, the Library hosted 14 enthusiastic participants who learned to make their own small change purse using upcycled materials. FabMo volunteer Gayatri Ratnam taught the attendees how to scale a pattern up or down while making this useful and beautiful item.





In addition to tabling at City Hall, the Library held our popular plant exchange in honor of Earth Day on Saturday, April 22. At least 70 people came to the Library to donate, exchange, and take home plants of all types, such as seedlings, cuttings, houseplants, plants in containers, and even shrubs and small trees.





Did you know that there are up to 40,000 muscles in an elephant's trunk and that some sea creatures are so small you can only see them under a microscope? On Thursday, April 20, the Library hosted 21 eager young learners as they explored animal facts such as these while crafting their own cats and dogs to take home. This engaging, educational program for children ages eight to 12 was made possible by the generous support of the Friends of the Mountain View Library.



On April 18, the Library hosted this year's final session of our free tax preparation assistance program, which was held Saturdays and Tuesdays from February 4 to April 18. Over the course of the 22 sessions, IRS-certified volunteers helped 654 customers prepare their returns or answer their tax-related questions.



On Wednesday, May 3, a wonderful crowd of 58 people joined us for a fascinating talk about the rich cultural history of San Jose Japantown. This regional history discussion was presented by local author, artist, and photographer Curt Fukuda and Ralph M. Pearce, co-author of *San Jose Japantown: A Journey*.
